Leaves." is a sequence of interrelating love poems that tell the story of the poet's love and then hate for the woman who infatuated him. Tracing his early intense feelings for Katharine, the poems quickly descend into a maelstrom of contradictory passions which leave the poet exhausted but creatively embroiled. The reader is free to trace the violent emotions that were born out of this love, the jealousy the poet feels for his woman's past, the negative tirades which plumb misogynistic depths, the pathetic realisation he has lost her, his plans to murder, his hallucinations, and his heartbreak. Throughout the trauma, love resurfaces weeping

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and is then buried once more under an avalanche of emotions that will leave the sensitive reader upset and anxious. "La belle dame sans merci" distances herself and the poet sees a man walking down a street "Where no street was, where no man was". In the 1970's and 80's, Jonathan Finch was singled out by editors and poets who published a great number of his poems in small magazines, pamphlets, and anthologies. He won prizes in British poetry competitions. When he was 33 he left the UK and has never been resident since. Reviewers have praised his previous two collections "Poems People Liked (1)" and "Poems People Liked (2)", expressing admiration for his poetic skills : "powerfully hewn poems" / "genuine, gripping, and beautiful" / "You can tell he's no amateur to poetry - every word is deliberate and meaningful".

He has published many books of poems for children and adults, and both his *Collected Poems* (2004) and *Selected Poems* (2006) are also available in Penguin. He presents *Poetry Please* on Radio 4 and is President of the Poetry Society. He was honoured with the Freedom of the City of Liverpool in 2001 and with a CBE in 2005 for services to literature.

Kinds of poetry There are three main kinds of poetry: narrative, dramatic and lyrical. It is not always possible to make distinction between them. For example, an epic poem can contain lyrical passages, or lyrical poem can contain narrative parts. Narrative poetry Is the kind of poetry which tells a story. Typical are the epic, the tale in verse, the romance. The ballad can also be included into narrative poetry because it contains a story. The epic poem The hero of epic poem is a special man endowed with physical strength, leadership, who respects a nation or race, and performs superhuman deeds. The dominant tone is heroic. The poem style is elevated, stylized, formal. The primary epic was based on the oral traditions of a country – see the *Iliad* and *Odyssey*. The major Anglo-Saxon example is *Beowulf*. The literary or secondary epic was modeled on the primary epic, and was the work of a learned, refined writer. Examples are Virgil's *Aeneid* and, in England, John Milton's *Paradise Lost*. The commonest metre of the epic blank verse (unrhythmic iambic pentameter). The solemnity and seriousness of the epic led, almost inevitably, to parody and burlesque. This is how mock-heroic or mock-epic poetry was born. One of the best examples in English is Alexander Pope's *The Rape of the Lock*. The tale in verse Narrative in verse was very popular during the Renaissance, and met great favour again in the Romantic period thanks to Walter Scott, who started his career as a poet, and George Byron. The romance The medieval romance was a tale in verse dealing with chivalry and love. Edmund Spenser's *Faerie Queene* and Alfred Tennyson's *Idylls of the King* are modeled on the medieval chivalric romance. Dramatic poetry The word "drama" implies one or more characters and action. Dramatic poetry aims at involving the reader in an experience or situation, and creates tension, immediacy, expectation, conflict. The speakers act out roles and therefore must not be identified with the poet. Many of John Donne's lyrics represent vivid examples of dramatic poetry. When one speaker only is involved and the poem is
